ONE CHILD'S CAC EXPERIENCE

At 2:00 a.m. on a recent Saturday, paramedics brought 12-year-old Sophia to the Emergency Room after she escaped a trafficking situation. Lured online to what she thought was a party, Sophia instead found herself trapped in an apartment with several adult men. Against all odds, she escaped and sought help from a neighbor, who called the police.

The hospital contacted the CAC's 24/7 on-call Coordinator, who immediately launched a trauma-informed, multi-agency response. Working with law enforcement, the Suffolk County District Attorney's Office, the Department of Children and Families, and our in-house mental health team, we ensured Sophia's safety and helped reunite her with her mother.



Just a few days later, Sophia visited the CAC, where she was met with compassionate, bilingual staff. For the first time, she felt heard and a weight was lifted. Our forensic interviewer conducted a one-time, age-appropriate interview while the investigative team observed from behind a two-way mirror. She also met with our Pediatric Sexual Assault Nurse Examiner, who helped her feel safe and understand her body would heal. The child is always at the center of everything we do.

While Sophia was in her interview, our Clinical Case Manager supported Sophia's mother, who was understandably devastated that something like this could happen to them. The Clinical Case Manager offered guidance and comfort in her native language and she was reassured knowing a team was working behind the scenes for her daughter's well-being.



Recognizing the family's urgent needs, we provided grocery gift cards and personally walked them to a nearby grocery store to ensure they had food that night—because healing starts with basic needs being met.

Thanks to the team's efforts and Sophia's courage, authorities built a strong case against the trafficker, ensuring he could no longer harm others. Sophia is now receiving specialized, evidence-based therapy at the CAC as she begins her healing journey.

Sophia's story is one of many. This is why the CAC exists—to support, protect, and empower children when they need it most. **And with your support, we can do even more.**


BREAKDOWN OF CHILDREN SERVED



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
TYPE OF ALLEGED MALTREATMENT*

THE RESERVE OF THE PARTY OF THE




REFERRALS BY RACE of those with known racial identity



REFERRALS BY GENDER




REFERRALS BY AGE




