A MESSAGE FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR AND BOARD CHAIR

At the Children's Advocacy Center of Suffolk County (CAC), 2023 was an intense year working to meet the acute and articulated needs of our community's most vulnerable children and their families.

We served more than 1,600 children affected by sexual abuse, physical abuse, commercial sexual exploitation and child trafficking. We educated over 5,800 members of our community to recognize, respond to, and prevent child abuse. And we continue to grow and innovate to maximize the support we provide to the children we serve, in the face of external challenges.

We launched a toolkit outlining our innovative response for missing youth that was adopted by CACs nationwide, began delivering mental health programming for preschool-aged children, and we reached more professionals and caregivers than ever before with our prevention trainings. We celebrated Susan Goldfarb's illustrious career at the helm of the CAC after her departure in April 2023 and two months later welcomed her successor, Annie Marcklinger Gordon, as our Executive Director.

The CAC's home, the Family Justice Center, was (and continues to be) under construction and suffered periodic flooding throughout the year. Despite these disruptions, our dedicated staff remained focused on delivering the best possible care to the children and families who need and deserve our nocost expert services.

As you review this report, we hope you can see and feel the positive impact the CAC is making in the lives of the children and families we serve in Suffolk County, across the Commonwealth, and beyond. It is your partnership and support that makes that impact possible.

We uphold our values in every interaction with partners, supporters, community members, families, and the children and youth we serve.




EQUITY AND INCLUSION


- We embrace and honor the diversity and cultural identities of our team, families, and community while acknowledging the presence of privileges and biases.

LEADERSHIP


- We uphold and implement trauma-informed practices, promote transparency, and advocate for systemic changes that enhance the overall safety and wellbeing of children and youth.


The CAC is constantly adapting to meet the needs of the children and families we serve. In 2023, we expanded services and trainings to care for two populations not previously adequately supported.

Our PSB-CBT was extended to include children ages 3-6 years old—making the CAC the only agency in the state offering this specialized intervention in-house at no cost to families.

Additionally, our SEEN program collaborated with our partners at My Life My Choice to develop a new training for professionals focused on supporting LGBTQ+ youth. In the Identification & Trauma-Informed Engagement of At-Risk & Exploited LGBTQ+ Youth professionals learn about the specific needs of LGBTQ+ youth who are at-risk and exploited and discuss strategies for effectively creating safe spaces and empowering youth to engage with multidisciplinary teams.


Connecting with the Community

Our Training and Outreach Program has the mission of raising awareness of child abuse and providing professionals, community members, and caregivers with the skills to prevent, recognize, and respond to the abuse and exploitation of children. In 2023, the team did just that and more—delivering 55% more trainings, reaching 76% more participants, and distributing resources at 83% more community events than the year before.





Educating & Learning in Suffolk County & Beyond



In 2023, CAC staff provided testimony to support survivors of trafficking, learned from other experts in the field right here in the Commonwealth and across the country, served as panelists at national conferences, and welcomed community partners for an informational Open House at the Family Justice Center.















Coming Together as a Team

Events included a trip to Encore Boston Harbor to help "Feed the Funnel," a staff retreat, and a festive Fall potluck.







Innovative and Compassionate Care



With 17 years of experience, the CAC and our Support to End Exploitation Now (SEEN) program has been a pioneer in recovering and supporting missing youth—leading countless teams to find youth missing across the country and bring them back home. We took our experience and lessons learned and created a road map for recovering and supporting missing youth.

Launched in January 2023, the "High-Risk Missing and Exploited Youth: Guidelines for the Multidisciplinary Team Response" toolkit was created in collaboration with the SEEN Steering Committee and with grant funding from the National Children's Alliance. Beyond the recovery, this toolkit provides guidance for professionals on how to wrap a safety net around each young person to reduce the risk of them going missing again.

What sets the CAC apart is our inclusion of expert mental health, interpersonal support, social service, and youth-serving providers that work hand-in-hand with law enforcement. It is not just about removing youth from harm, but, most importantly, helping them begin to heal.

We believe every missing and exploited youth should have a specialized, expert team driving their trauma-informed intervention. The toolkit is designed to support just that.




